Comparison of Frictional Properties of CVD-Grown MoS₂ and Graphene Films under Dry Sliding Conditions

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Figure S1. Raman spectra of (**a**) MoS₂ and (**b**) graphene samples. The thickness of prepared MoS₂ samples corresponds to 2L, 4L, and 12L thickness. Graphene corresponds to 1L thickness.

Depending on the number of MoS₂ layer, E¹_{2g} and A_{1g} Raman mode changes. With increasing the number of layer, the frequency of E¹_{2g} exhibits redshifts, while that of A_{1g} shows blueshifts. Therefore, the number of layer (or the thickness) can be determined. C. Lee et al. (Anomalous Lattice Vibrations of Single- and Few-Layer MoS₂, ACS Nano Vol. 4, pp 2695–2700, 2010) proposed the Raman frequencies as an indicator of the layer thickness and this method have been widely used. The frequency differences (cm⁻¹) between these two Raman modes in Supplementary Figure S1 (2L(20), 4L(24), 12L(25)) are very close to the reference data. Figure S2. Optical images taken from the bare SiO₂ and 1L graphene samples after 20 sliding cycles on macro-scale. After 20 sliding cycles, sever wear damages were observed on 1L graphene samples. This indicates that the tested 1L graphene cannot protect sliding surfaces.
