An accurate analysis of observed mechanical, physical, chemical and biochemical changes should facilitate process optimization and minimize the risk of food component degradation and the loss of functional and flavoring properties. The wide range of operations that make use of this technology include extraction, emulsification, solid dispersion, freezing, drying, cutting, degassing/defoaming, thawing, microorganism inactivation, meat tenderization, filtration and crystallization. The huge production volumes found in the food industry require highly efficient, large-scale reactors that are designed for flow processes where turbulence, share and cavitational effects are modelled in numerical simulations
