Heterogeneous catalysis, exploiting photo- and electro-chemical reactions, has expanded rapidly in the last few decades, having undergone various developments, especially from the energetic and the environmental points of view. Photocatalysis plays a pivotal role in applications, such as water splitting and air/water remediation. Electrocatalysis can be found in a large array of research fields, including the development of electroanalytical sensors, waste water treatment and energy conversion devices (e.g., batteries, fuel and solar cells, etc.).
